Hands from Bath Bridge Club - 6th August 2015

End plays of various types are amongst the most interesting situations in card play technique. Here are four examples from an ordinary club duplicate yesterday.

Taf opened 1♣ second in hand and rebid 2♣ over my 1♠ response. I was reluctant to leave it here at pairs so I rebid 2♠ and this finished the bidding. The opening lead was the 8♥. I won the Ace (deceptively dropping the 6 from hand) and led the J♠ from dummy. My plan was to lose this to West, win the next heart, cash the A♠ and then play 3 rounds of clubs. This plan went wrong when East covered the J with the Q♠. I was obliged to win and play 3 rounds of clubs now hoping that West would have to ruff with a trump trick. This play also went wrong because West ruffed low and played Ace and another diamond. I ruffed and tried the 9♠ and was dismayed when West showed out. This was the position now:

East was on lead and it seemed as if the defence must make two trump tricks. However East made the mistake of forcing me with a diamond. I ruffed and crossed to dummy with the Q♥. Now I led a winning club and East was fixed. A diamond discard just delayed the agony – I discarded the K♥ and the lead was in dummy at trick 12 so I had to score a trick with my 8♠.

87% (even with 11 tricks being available in a club contract)

A few hands later, this hand came up.

Taf opened 2♦ (Multi) and I responded 2NT (relay). Taf bid 3♦ showing a maximum weak 2 in Spades. Although I had only 13 HCP, they were all fully working for a spade contract so I bid 4♠. West led the 3♠ which was not so good for me.

I decided to win the A♣ and try a low spade to the 10♠ won by West's J♠. West continued with a second club taken by East won returned the J♠. Now, seeing all the cards, I could just run the Q♠ and make an easy 11 tricks but this put all my eggs in the basket of finding West with K♠. I decided instead to win both top diamonds and then ruff the third round with the 9♠ in dummy. If East overruffs with the King, I still have a good chance but in practice, East discarded a heart. This was the position at this stage:

I now played A♥ and ruffed a heart in dummy, then ruffed a club and ruffed another heart. In the three card ending, I exited with the last club and claimed the last two tricks with A8 of spades. 100% - but because no-one else was bidding game.

Here was an interesting position

The bidding is best forgotten, but South ended up declarer in 3NT X. Taf was West and he cashed two diamonds, then switched to the 2♠. Declarer had little chance but decided to cash 4 rounds of hearts. Unsure of the position in diamonds and spades, I decided as East to keep all my clubs so that at trick 8 dummy had all 6 clubs and so did I.

Dummy exited with the 2♣ and I won with the J♣. This was the position (declarer and West's hand were irrelevant at this stage):

I exited with the 6♣. Dummy won with the 7♣ and tried the 9♣. I won with the K♣ and when I exited with the 5♣ the two card ending with dummy to play was:

Q 3 K 4

Last two tricks to the defence for +300 and 87%

Now, what would have happened if South had passed 3♣X and I had led my partner's suit (a spade)? Carnage? Nope – unexpectedly, North would have made the contract by careful play! Win the A♣ and play a low heart to the J♥. Cash the K♠ and ruff a spade. Now cash two more top hearts and lead a 4th heart from dummy. Whatever East does at this stage declarer cannot be prevented from scoring 3 trump tricks and landing the contract!

Taf had a complex endplay on this hand (assisted by a forgivable misdefence)

East opened 1♣ and, too strong to overcall 1NT, Taf doubled. I responded 1♥ and passed Taf's 2NT rebid. The opening lead was the 7♣ covered by the 8 and 9 and taken with South's 10♣. Taf returned a club to the K♣ and A♣, West discarding the 2♥, after which East switched to the 2♦. Taf unsuccessfully tried the J♦ and won the third round of the suit with the Ace. He then cleared the clubs – West discarding a low spade – and took East's Q♠ with the Ace.

Now, on the last club, West made the mistake of discarding another heart. Dummy discards a spade and East is in trouble. If the 4♥ is discarded, declarer can just play Ace and another heart – so, East must discard a spade. Now Taf was able to cash the A♠ and lead the J♥. East wins with West's 10 dropping and is now endplayed to lead away from his other heart honour. 75% scored.
